Course Description

This class is an introduction on how to set up and operate software assembly lines on Public Clouds in the fashion of a "Ford Model T" assembly line. This class introduces you to the basic operations, methodologies, and principles of enterprise software development, where developers and system administrators skillsets merge to manage both software *dev*elopment and software *op*erations. In the same way that languages like Java, C#, and Python power app development, languages like Terraform, Chef, and Ansible provision Public Clouds and no time is lost moving from application development to production operations and back. If application *dev*elopment is about building an aircraft, *op*erations is the aircraft carrier that launches them into service and *DevOps* is how to do it to optimize the speed of IT.

Learning Outcomes

Learning outcomes common to all College of Engineering Graduate programs:

- 1. An ability to identify, formulate, and solve complex engineering problems.
- 2. An ability to explain and apply engineering design principles, as appropriate to the program's educational objectives.
- 3. An ability to produce solutions that meet specified end-user needs with consideration of public health, safety, and welfare, as well as global, cultural, social, environmental, and economic factors.

The Information Systems Program accepts students of different engineering backgrounds with minimum programming skills and produces first class Information Systems engineers that operate at the intersection of real-world complexity, software development, and IT management. Graduating students will be able to construct end-to-end advanced software applications that meet business needs.

Specific Learning Outcomes for the class:

You will get accustomed to moving seamlessly from one development language and platform to another because in the modern software industry no one tool or one language is enough. You will learn how to containerize a Web app written in C#, java, python, or Node with *Docker* and deploy it and scale it as a microservice, the basic unit of modern enterprise software.

You will learn about fundamental notions such as *Stack 2020*, the difference between *DevOps* and *Agile*, how companies like Uber and Netflix engineer enterprise applications as *microservices*, and the fundamentals of *Public Clouds* AWS and Azure, all of which are often part of job interview questions.

You will practice what you learn with hands-on labs and become an expert in how to create *Virtual Machines* and *Containers*, how to deploy software with scripting languages like *Terraform*, how to provision with *Ansible*, *Chef*, and the instructor's favorite *Juju*, how to automate and scale operations with orchestration platforms like *Kubernetes*, how to streamline deployment with Continuous integration and Continuous Delivery (*CI/CD*) pipelines, and how to monitor for performance with *Prometheus*.
