Course Prerequisites

Graduate level INFO 5100 Minimum Grade of C- or Graduate level CSYE 6200 Minimum Grade of C-.

Course Description

Covers application development for mobile devices using advanced development platforms. Focuses on how to write mobile applications using cross-platform development tools and processes. Topics include user interfaces, the software life cycle, persistent storage, networking using HTTP and other REST interfaces, and mobile/handheld data applications. Requires a final project.

Course Learning Outcomes

The goal of this course is to create an environment where the students are exposed to the practice of developing iOS applications using Swift and the Cocoa Touch framework within the Xcode/iOs paradigm.

Coverage of the underlying theory coupled with hands-on exercises through the development of innovative solutions to practical problems will enable them to develop expertise in this expanding domain and prepare them to confidently face the increasing needs and challenges of the mobile application industry.
