#### **Course Description**

Exposes students to both conceptual and technical aspects of Web design. User experience design is the discipline of creating a useful and usable website or application that is easily navigated and meets the needs of both the site owner and its users. Covers Web standards and best practices. Studies the fundamental concepts, techniques, practices, work flows, and tools associated with the practice of user-experience design in Web interfaces. Offers students an opportunity to learn the core principles of information architecture, usability, marketing hierarchy, and user experience for contextual, value-driven websites. Additional areas of focus include typography, color theory and composition, responsive design, CSS3 concepts, basic scripting, and JavaScript libraries to create functional, effective, and visually appealing websites.

## **Standard Learning Outcomes**

Learning outcomes common to all College of Engineering Graduate programs:

- 2. An ability to explain and apply engineering design principles, as appropriate to the program's educational objectives.

The Information Systems Program accepts students of different engineering backgrounds with minimum programming skills and produces first class Information Systems engineers that operate at the intersection of real-world complexity, software development, and IT management. Graduating students will be able to construct end-to-end advanced software applications that meet business needs.

Specific Learning Outcomes for the Information Systems program:

- 1. Create a strong technical foundation through diverse, high-level courses
- 2. Built crucial interpersonal skills needed to succeed in any industry

3. Foster a deep level of applied learning through project based case studies

## **Course Outcomes and Assessment Standards**

After successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Build a static website from scratch that follows industry best practices regarding:
  - a. mobile-first design
  - b. responsive elements
  - c. semantic HTML
  - d. basic accessibility(a11y) concerns
- 2. Manage interactive elements on a web page using Javascript to create an effective user experience
- 3. Understand core user interface/user experience concepts (UI/UX) and be able to evaluate the appropriateness of different options for solving interaction needs
- 4. Use the above elements in a dynamic web site/page/application when provided a framework in which to do so
- 5. Understand different CSS management approaches
- 6. Participate in a discussion that connects the technical, visual, and interactive elements of a web project
- 7. Use common industry tools such as Git and Github to receive and submit work, and Slack to communicate regarding the assigned projects.

The course involves weekly individual assignments due the night before the next class. Short weekly quizzes regarding the concepts from previous classes are conducted at the start of each class using the university Canvas learning management system. A midterm web project and final project are both done in the same manner as the weekly assignments, given via github to be completed outside of class and submitted as a pull request in github by the due date.

A student's grade will be calculated from a potential 100% using the following breakdown. The instructor can and will modify grades based on the cumulative demonstrated understanding of the material.

- Participation: 10%
- Assignments: 20% (the lowest assignment grade will be excluded)
- Quizzes: 20% (The lowest quiz score will be excluded)
- Midterm Project: 20%
- Final Project: 20%
